# Rotary Recognition Rewards The David School

### Thanks to everyone's continuing support

On the evening of Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup> April, David Wallwork attended the House of Lords, Westminster, London to be presented with a Rotary Champion of Change Award, for setting up and developing the David School in the village known as Mile 36 in Koya Chiefdom, Sierra Leone amongst the Temne tribe.



For over 100 years Rotary has always had the philosophy that if there is a problem, then there is a solution, and the Champions of Change Awards are given in recognition of the humanitarian service of Rotary members.

Readers of the David School Messenger will have followed David's story from his first trip Freetown in Sierra Leone in 2005 to help extend a Fistula Clinic run by Mercy Ships, when he became aware of physical and emotional problems associated with living in the poverty-stricken and war-ravaged country, unlike anything he'd experienced before. During this visit, he was taken 'up-country' to an area where there were no schools and people still used a thumb print to prove identity. A teacher, and then a head-teacher, all his working life, David has always felt that 'Education Changes Lives', and following discussion with tribal elders, he built and established what the locals named the David School, which first opened in 2008.

Subsequently, the David School Trust has been established, the school extended several times, local teachers employed and trained, many children given an education and opportunities that they wouldn't have otherwise had, clean water provided, health care and health education improved, and many community self-sufficiency projects supported. Development continues. There are now nearly 250 primary pupils and 130 secondary students. The latest projects will provide a new toilet block and even better teaching.

#### It is for this, that he has been named a Champion of Change.
