## The Community's Health


#### Water Harvesting

Improving the pupils' health through educating them and their families is one of the school's aims. During this last visit, the drainage and water harvesting systems around the school buildings have been completed. This now enables children to wash their hands after visiting the latrines.

#### Africa Mercy Visit

The hospital ship, Africa Mercy, will be moored in Kissy Dock, Freetown,

cleft lips, and other disfiguring conditions such as goitres, dental defects and scars from burns. All the treatment is free. The David School will be used as an assessment centre, so all the pupils and their families will be checked, and this will be a great opportunity to remedy many conditions.



### **Lighting for Adult Classes**

Six PV panels have been donated by Navitron Ltd from Oakham, and it was intended that an electrical system would be installed, but the ship carrying the panels and other vital equipment broke down, and the vital equipment didn't arrive until the day David & Mike left. The equipment is now in safe-keeping with the British Royal Engineers in Freetown, who will hopefully install them. Until then the adult classes will continue by candlelight!

## Soap Making – A Community Project



When Jennie Richards visited the school in March 2010, she decided she wanted to help one of the teachers, Joseph Kai Lamin, set up a small business, to make the community more self-sufficient. When she returned she raised the money to start the a small soap making enterprise in the village at Mile 36, and this business is now making & selling, and even has
